Minister's Preface

Let me suggest that alongside the quantifiable measurers of the past year there are also the numerous acts of kindnesses such as the phone call to enquire about someone's health, the smile of encouragement, praying with someone or chatting to someone new in the Cafe. These are not easily recorded in a report. They exist below the surface- but they make all the difference.

So, while I commend these reports to you I do so with the caveat that they are the surface of the visible iceberg. We also acknowledge all the generous words and actions that you offer to make church possible.

Finally, I express our thanks to all our staff: Sarah for her caring presence of administration and friendship, Jackie for the meticulously produced accounts, Teresa's ministry around the buildings, Annie and Fiona's hospitality within the Café, Sally and Ellen's nurturing among families, and Hilary & Louise's outstanding work in the Nestling Nursery.

For all that that has been planned and measurable we give thanks to God, but we also give praise for all the spontaneous Christ filled moments of freedom.

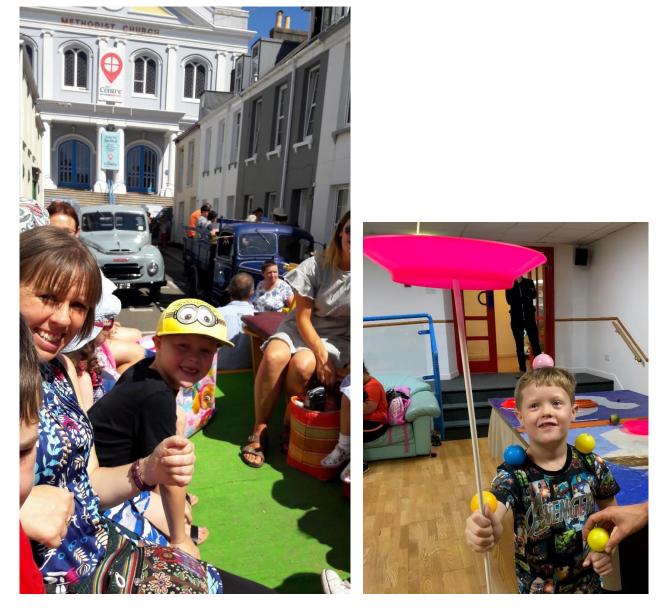
Please let us know so that we keep you in our thoughts and prayers.

Looking back, the pattern of our work during 2018-2019 has been very similar to the past few years.

We continue to make relationships with parents and children at the Toddler Groups on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday. And with children at 7up and on Sundays.

Toddler Church on a Monday morning is now so well attended that we keep having to make the square of chairs bigger. Many of the parents come and go, but we do have quite a few regular families. Every session is different according to who is there that day. Our little team of helpers seem to be diminishing all the time, which as the numbers are increasing makes our work load more and more challenging. So, if anyone is free on a Monday morning to make tea, move chairs, get toys out, or just to be there as a role model, we would make you very welcome.



The Tuesday Group is large in numbers and noise, and as always is very popular. We have run it the same for years but as it works so well there is no reason to change it. The lunchtime Wednesday Group is also very busy now. We think that for some young families this time, 12-2pm, suits well.

"7up", has also taken on a new least of life. We now have around 14 children attending each time. More people to help here would also be very helpful.

Our Sunday Children are still, and I think always will be, very variable. We never know how many children we will have, what ages they will be, or if what we have planned will be suitable. Generally, we get it more or less right, but planning is not easy. We can never carry a theme over from week to week as we never know who will be there. We do feel that at this moment of time we are seeing a few more regular families, which we are so grateful for.

In the not so far off future we will need to provide something for our new babies. How exciting!

During the last year we have ventured something new -Messy Sunday. We have only had two so far but are planning one for 28th April. Both the previous ones were very well attended, and great fun. We had all the activities and the worship in the Church, then the entertainment and food downstairs. This next time we plan to have all the activities downstairs, go upstairs for worship, then come back down again for food. We are not having any entertainment this time so we will see if it makes a difference to the attendance.

Last year in the summer we ran our annual all age Holiday club, which seems to work well. Having families together enjoying activities and worship is always so worthwhile.

In August we went on Lorries as we have done for a few years. This attracts families from the edges of our community, and there are always more people wanting to come than there are Lorries. A fun time on the beach having a picnic in the sun, what could be better?



On Christmas Eve our Sunday children, and a few others who we gathered in, performed "A Little Nativity". The children loved doing this, and it was very much appreciated by everyone. As every year Sunday rehearsals are not always well attended, but the two rehearsals we have a few days before is when it all comes together. To say thank you for taking part in the play we all go bowling in the New Year. This is another family event, which is also very popular.

Although in general the groups and events are the same, nothing stays the same for ever. We welcome last year's changes with Messy Sunday, and also the new babies, who have arrived into our congregation. We look forward to what God has in store for us during this year and thank him for all his blessings of the past.

It has been a great year for growing the leadership team by 100%, from just Cathy Morling, to the addition of Marcia Lee. She brings a natural ability to relate to the age group and a powerful humility to serve. This will be transformative going forward.

Sunday Youth on a Sunday morning can regularly see five attending, with more when we have a specific project. The age-span is ten to eighteen, which is a stretch and a challenge when considering topics and issues to discuss. The group's sense of belonging to the Church has deepened this year, helped by participating in a number of special services with music and drama. "The Spirit of Christmas" was a highlight, performed at the New Year's Banquet Service, adapted from a piece written by Naomi Bidmead for Bethesda's children and youth. We used film, puppets and 12 young people were involved in multiple roles.

The young people washed cars one Sunday to help raise funds for the Higher Tour – a mission in secondary schools that took place in September 2018 - and a number attended the Beetle Drive to fundraise for the Island to Island Christian Aid Appeal. We would like to engage the group with more projects where they can see faith in action. There is an appetite for more social gatherings and although the annual Garage Club Cinema Outing in the Christmas holidays was very popular, with a group of 23 going to see 'Spiderman: Into the Spider-verse', we have limited capacity to arrange much more.

Our Sunday morning material is usually from Youth For Christ Resources, but has been supplemented by videos from the New Good News Edition of the Bible and exploring the "Talk Jesus" videos. Group games are an important feature alongside discussions, and one week we all wrote to the orphans we support as a Church, from_Watoto in Uganda, in the hope to build relationships and hope.



There are fewer regular musicians and singers attending at the moment, but there have been occasional sessions preparing music for Sunday services led by Ben Shaw, Libby Farnon and supported by Sue De Gruchy when they can. The Youth Band would benefit from new musicians, perhaps from within the whole church family in the future.

Garage Club - Sunday evenings once a month, means lots of fun for tens to teens, but following last year of exploring different venues, we have returned to the original model of the Centre as the base. We still go to other locations, like the beach, and once supported an all age event at St. Andrews, but the core group only feel secure at the Centre and prefer less change. A guest speaker, Vusa, from Christians in Sport, led dodgeball for the group when he visited Garage Club, and this has set a new favourite activity for the group. We are grateful to Rev Mark Barrett for his support of our leadership team, with various parents helping out, and Rev Tony Morling a regular facilitator. On Easter Sunday our BBQ on the beach with volleyball gathered 20 young people and some of their families for games and a time of reflection. We hope to find ways for our youths to deepen their spiritual lives in the coming year. An opportunity to explore membership, or creation of a clearer promotion pathway into Youth would be beneficial. There will be no Jersey Keswick or New Wine this year, so it would be good if we can plan an overnight trip in Jersey or join another church for a UK trip in the coming year to broaden their faith experiences and increase their potential encounters with Jesus.



Women's Ministry at The Centre

The distinctive and intentional ministry for women at the Centre continues in the shape of 'Recharge' – a morning of time to receive, reflect and recharge the spiritual batteries. Numbers are around 30 drawn regularly from, on average, eight different churches. This is a team-inspired ministry, involving Cathy Morling, Lou Hicklin, Helen Parker and Naomi Bidmead from Bethesda.

There have been three 'Recharge' gatherings this year. The first in June 2018 was an exploration of 'Truth', with Helen Parker and Naomi Bidmead speaking and helping us to consider how God's truth sets us free, looking at Ephesians 6 and putting on the armour of God, including the belt of truth. The second was in November 2018, focusing on imagery of hands in the Bible, particularly within Psalm 91: *"his angels...will lift you up in their hands"* and Cathy Morling shared images and testimony of God's hands at work and Him using her hands in the mission trip to Bolivia with the charity Talitha. The third was in March 2019 with the theme of 'Breath', exploring Ezekiel 37, reflecting on our own breathing and what might be blockages to breathe in more of God's Spirit into our lives. We've been grateful to Catherine Baudains for supporting us periodically on the piano for our times of worship, the hospitality has been supported by different members of the Centre and then more recently Café Manager, Annie Vatcher. Lou Hicklin's creative input and insights are invaluable.

Each gathering is unique and meaningful for those attending. We encourage each morning to include discussion, Bible study, prayer, personal reflection and opportunities to respond or explore themes creatively. It is increasingly less dependent on the input of one speaker, often having multiple voices. The feedback is very positive and we have a database of contacts which we use to inform of the next gathering. We find that emailing reminders are essential, as well as producing high quality publicity postcards with all three dates for the year ahead printed on them.

The expenses for each morning are relatively small, but a basket for donations towards the cost of the refreshments offsets the expenses.

'Recharge' brings women at the Centre closer together, creates opportunities to grow in fellowship with women from other churches and across denominations. There is plenty of room for growth in this area, as it is distinctive to most women's breakfasts. We look forward to another year of special ministry, releasing gifts, hearing from more women's voices, deepening our spiritual journeys and taking the opportunities to stop and listen to God in our busy lives.



Report from Management and Finance

Whilst the repair and maintenance of the Centre is one of the main responsibilities of the Committee the welfare and employment of the staff is another important role which is also part of the Committee's remit. The Committee acknowledges the hard work carried out by the dedicated team at the Centre without which the current activities run by the Church and others at the Centre could not be sustained at such a successful level.



The repair and maintenance of the buildings continues with the repair of the window on the West side being completed and important repairs to the interior of flats 1 and 2 Ruby Ferguson House also

carried out. The organ is another item which needs to be maintained and whilst some upgrades have been agreed we are advised that the organ would benefit from one or two more substantial pieces of work.



The refurbishment of the café by the Brick Foundation has greatly enhanced the facilities of the Church and the Committee is looking at improving the Youth Room.

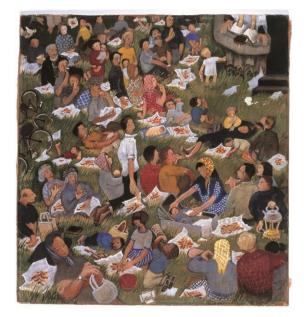

Comments on the Accounts

Attached are the audited accounts for the Church as well as the Nursery for the year ending 31st August 2018.

The Church accounts show a surplus of £12,505 as against a budget deficit of £44,864

There are a number of factors which have brought this about, namely

An increase of £7,785 over budget in the income from room hire

The sum of £39,253 spent on repairs and maintenance as against a budget figure of £65,000

An increase of £20,099 over budget in miscellaneous income as a result of an increase in the

anticipated transfer from the nursery

The budget for the current year shows an expected deficit of £70,186. The grants from the Circuit and the District have expired.

As last year the sum of £65,000 has been allocated for repairs and maintenance.

The audited accounts for the Nursery give a surplus of $\pounds 59,714$ as against a budget surplus of $\pounds 42,890$ and this despite undertaking a major refurbishment of the garden costing approximately $\pounds 50,000$.

The two main reasons for this are the increase in income due to the nursery being full for most of the year and the continued very tight control of expenditure especially wages.

Nestling Day Care Centre Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 August 2019

- 1 Fee income is above that anticipated. The main reason for this is that the Nursery was nearly full for the whole year (we budget for having two spaces). Each space generates income of approximately £14,300 (average) per year.
- 2 The majority of interest received is from the Central Finance Board (£100). The remainder comes from Lloyds TSB in Jersey. Interest rates remained very low for the year.

The dividend from the Co-op was not claimed during the year and will be recognised when received.

- 3 Staff costs have again been tightly controlled for the year which has resulted in another pleasing reduction in anticipated costs. One member of staff was required to repay training costs incurred in previous periods and that is the reason for a negative expense in the current financial year.
- 4 Food and toiletries expenditure remain tightly controlled and the result is pleasing considering that the Nursery was forced to find another new source for hot meals in the period which resulted in a cost increase. Expenditure on toiletries remains very low and wastage is tightly controlled.

There were no items of value held in stock at the 5 end of the year.

6 St Helier Methodist Centre provides book-keeping and accountancy services via their own Treasurer, for which the Nursery pays their calculated share.

A report from the office

It has been busy in the office again this year with several changes.

The States Adult Day Services (the Le Geyt group) are changing the hours they rent the Youth Room. From the beginning of the summer term they will be coming in on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. They have identified that it may be time for them to look again at community bases they access as the needs of their client group change.

Jackie, who does such invaluable work as Treasurer, has been working from home more often as her other responsibilities have increased. She is now in the office about once a fortnight.

As always, volunteers have contributed greatly; particularly Michael counting teabags and Sean doing building maintenance.

New legislation in 2018 has had specific implications for the office:

The General Data Protection Regulations came into force in May 2018. These affect the collection, use and storage of all personally identifiable data. Moving into compliance with GDPR is an ongoing process in the office and is the reason we have not printed the useful names and addresses section in the Year Book and Prayer Diary 2018-2019. It is also why we now have two very smart red filing cabinets in the office - they are lockable.

The Centre (including the Nursery) has submitted to be officially registered as a charity - as required by a new law. The charity register contains key information about each charity and, with some limited exceptions, is fully open to public inspection so that people can, if they wish, understand more about the purposes, finances and public benefit delivery of the charities that they wish to support.

The Food bank has not taken up as much of my time this year but is still active. When people are referred to us – particularly from Citizens Advice – we give them groceries and vouchers for electricity. Thank you so much to everyone who donates tins and packets.

Finally, of course, the renovation of the Café was fascinating to watch, and it is great to enjoy the result. Such a difference from the office window!

Nestling, **formerly known as Aquila Nursery**, is now in its 42nd year and the longest established Childcare Nursery on the Island.

We have evolved into a much-needed full time childcare facility catering for babies from 3 months to preschool age as more mothers feel the need to return to the workplace.

During the past year many of our loyal staff undertook extra study workshops outside of working hours in order to keep up to date with the many changes in Education.

This has been acknowledged in the recent Registration Review. Much credit was expressed of the leadership skills of the Nursery Manager Louise Jones-Butel whose enthusiasm has been inspiring for the Nursery Staff. We wish to record here our sincere thanks to Louise who has extended her knowledge and management skills again this year.

The day to day management of the Nursery is a complex mixture of juggling acts in order to ensure the smooth running of the business and most importantly that our child/ratios are met. Safeguarding has been a very serious issue.

Last year we welcomed the birth of a baby daughter for one of our Team Leaders. Jade is returning this April after a six-month maternity break. It has been difficult to find cover staff during such breaks. Many of our staff worked extra hours to cover this six-month maternity period and we are most grateful to all of them. A second member of staff is beginning her six-month maternity break.

Qualified Nursery officers are in short supply. It is perhaps one of the most challenging aspects of recruitment.

We have been supported greatly during the past year by Tony, the Nursery Committee, Sally, Sarah and Jackie for her financial advice and we must not forget David Hicklin who performs the duties of Father Christmas each year.

Last August we commenced the refurbishment of the Nursery Garden. This was a large project and an expensive undertaking. Please take a look at the result of which we are very proud. We are in action again this Spring to complete the purchase of plants and some necessary play equipment.

Finally, thanks to Martin and David for all their DIY skills. There are always jobs to be done in the Nursery which they carry out in such a cheerful manner.

Thanks to Lou Hicklin for taking the Minutes and thank you to Sarah Keenan-Fox for all her hard work in compiling and printing the Reports which were distributed prior to the meeting.

- 1. Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 7th May 2017 have been circulated, agreed and signed off by TM.
- 2. Membership Changes: New members have joined SHMC and we rejoice in receiving people from the world church (all names are at the bottom of page 5 of the AGM Report).

3. Church Stewards & elects to church council: David Vasselin (Senior Steward) is standing down as Steward after his 6-year term. DV spoke about Val MacDonald joining as Steward from today and what a blessing she will be to the team. Val was presented with her keys to the building as a token of her union with the Stewards. Financial Overview – Peter advised that the majority of the financial work is done by Jackie in the office who does both the church and the nursery accounts. Jackie is a real blessing to us, and thanks were offered to her for all her hard work, as without her we would really struggle.

Accounts: Prior to the accounts being read PL advised that the copy of the accounts in the circulated report were in fact last years and an up to date 2018 financial report was circulated to all members at the meeting.

Church: Peter advised that the audited accounts show a surplus of £44,902 as against a budget deficit of £20,026 (see comments on handout).

Financial report accepted and unanimously agreed.

We are approaching the last year of a three-year grant scheme with the Methodist Circuit. As we are now showing surplus finances SHMC would not be asking the circuit to contribute by way of grant for the forthcoming future.

Nursery: Nursery accounts professionally audited and agreed by all present.

TM expressed thanks to PL and the management team for all that they do. PL asked to express our thanks to Jackie for all she does. Thank you to PL for all he does with this huge undertaking.

TM commented appreciation to so many who invest in the life of the church and thanks to management for all you do in the course of the year and with the upkeep of the property. The church has a fantastic staff team: Sarah, Sally, Ellen, Teresa, Annie & Fiona. The members showed their appreciation.

- 6. Ministers Comments TM asked the members to consider some of our current mission activities:

 - New Song
 - Discipleship pathway

PT commented that there is so much going on in the Centre during the week. He commented that it was important to remember all those who use the building regardless of not actually being members of this church. The fact that they come into the Centre is 'Planting the seed'. Perhaps more church members could find some time to come into the café to witness this and share time there.

Pat Tourtel expressed the view that we were very impressed with our President of the Methodist Church. Pat would like us to think about whether we are part of a declining church and not a declining Gospel as written by the President in an article in Connection Magazine, and that it is too easy to sit still rather than take risks, so let us consider the radical to remain positive going forward.

Roy asked for evidence of our efforts to 'research social exclusions in Jersey and to offer real change to those in need'. Sarah talked about the continuation of the Food Bank and how often it is used. TM has been to Scotland with a party of 15 including the Chief Minister, Ian Gorst, to discuss and witness how Scotland achieve engagement with those brought up in Care and to find out how they achieve the results that they do. Scotland are considering visiting Jersey to continue trying enable us to find a way to deal with local social exclusion. Along with that, the JEC recognise the need for supplements to those in need of costly and unaffordable electricity. What we do as church is to ask questions and be a voice for the less fortunate in our community and this is how we can all play a part in bringing these issues to light.

- 7. Sally & Ellen children's work SV explained that Messy church is having a break. So instead of continuing it has been decided to embark on a new venture called Messy Sunday. This will be held once a quarter during an All Age Worship. The first one will be taking place on 24th June and it is hoped that families who would normally enjoy Messy Church will join us for the Messy Celebration on a Sunday.
