Minister's Preface

Welcome to these annual reports. I hope that you find them a useful reminder of where SHMC has journeyed in the past year and a guide for our future direction. They tell our story. They tell of the comings, goings and doings of this Church. They tell of Christ alive among us. They tell of the Spirit calling, guiding and empowering us. There is much for us to give thanks to God for!

Despite much lower numbers of ordained Ministers within our Circuit, we've discovered unexpected benefits as we've got to know members of other Methodist churches much better. For many this has been a great joy, not least as the singing is so much stronger, and we can really let rip with the hymns that we love. The children and youth work has flourished on those Sundays when the adult congregation has met elsewhere, with the Café offering a space for fellowship and bible study for parents. Perhaps there is much for us to consider about the future direction of our Sunday worship? In addition, there has been some wonderful services led by our church members. While we don't know what the future holds, we can be sure that if we approach it with the right attitude and commitment, we have every reason to be full of hope. Christ is with us, and keeping our eyes upon him, we'll find him guiding and preparing the way.

Another innovation has been having joint steward's meetings across the four churches in our section of St Martins, Ebenezer and Georgetown. This has helped encourage joint initiatives such as the Tuesday bible studies at 2.30pm, and the sharing of ideas and resources. Methodism has always had a strong sense of collegiality and belonging to a shared island faith community. I'm convinced that the future flourishing of our mission will be to play to that strength and not see ourselves as separate, self-contained congregations. That will require courage and faith, but the way forward is shown in Jesus' prayer in John's Gospel chapters fifteen and seventeen.

I conclude by acknowledging the contributions of numerous people who collectively enable the church to function. Our management team who has had a particularly busy year, the many volunteers who do everything from pouring tea to watering the plants, teaching our young people, the team of circuit local preachers and worship leaders, musicians, and of course our excellent stewards.

Sincere thanks also go to Julie for her excellent administration and collating these reports; Jackie and Eva who have meticulously produced the accounts; Theresa's ministry of cleaning our buildings; Sally and Ellen's nurture among children and parents; and Jane, Louise, and the Nestling Committee for their ministry in the Nestling Nursery. Each of us has a unique calling and ministry, and may you exercise it fully to praise God and love your neighbour.

As Paul wrote, "We can do all things through Him who gives us strength," Philippians 4:13, and so we go forward in faith and confidence.

William Smith 1816 to 1896

Released during Black History Month, a set of commemorative stamps issued by Jersey Post highlighted six individuals who played a part in Jersey's diverse history, bringing to the forefront stories which have often been overlooked.

Included among them is William Smith a Local Preacher in this church. Born in Ghana in 1816, Mr Smith was the illegitimate son of a Yorkshireman working for the Royal African Company, which was trading on the Gold Coast, and the daughter of a local chieftain. When his father was transferred to Sierra Leone, William joined him there and rose up through the ranks of the civil service. He eventually become Registrar of the Mixed Commission Court and an active member of the anti-slavery movement. Under his leadership, 33,072 slaves were freed and 344 slave vessels were intercepted by the British.





In 1871, William emigrated to Britain with his family. They lived in London for about two years before moving to Jersey for the benefit of his wife's health. The family lived at 13, Queen's Road and attended Wesley Grove Methodist Chapel, where William was a lay preacher. He also preached at Methodist chapels across the Island.

He is described as a passionate advocate for female education and was one of the founder members of the Jersey Ladies College, where he eventually sent his own daughters. The first meeting of the committee members took place in the vestry at Wesley Grove and the school was founded with the aim of providing an education for the girls of "families of modest means."

One of William's daughters, Adelaide, spent several years being taught at home by a governess, before attending Jersey Ladies College. She described in her memoirs how "my father announced that he had joined the committee of an up-to-date college, which we were to attend as foundation pupils". In our back vestry there is now a plaque reminding us of that committee that met in that room to provide "general instruction of the highest class, together with moral and religious teaching".

Adelaide excelled at the Ladies College and went on to study music in Germany. She married a Ghanaian barrister in London and then returned to Sierra Leone, where she followed in her father's footsteps by continuing to advocate for female education. William Smith died in St Helier in 1896 and was buried alongside his wife in Almorah Cemetery. This story, based on research by Adenike Ogunkoya of Adenhist Black Histories, is part of a series in collaboration with Jersey Heritage

The stamps are the work of Pola Maneli, a freelance illustrator based in South Africa. Pola comments: "From a background of adversity, the nature of the Black people who lived and thrived through Jersey's history is one of grace. By contextualising these figures within the wider history of the Island, the hope was that the illustrations would help to bring that grace to the forefront of people's minds."

With the helpful assistance of the Melanie Seal, Municipal Services Department of St Helier Parish, and Office of the Superintendent Registrar, Tony has now located the grave. Before he leaves, he is intending to place the Sunday church flowers on the grave, and thereby remembering and honouring the Smith's outstanding contribution to island life. Do speak to him if you would like to join him.



Pastoral Review

During the past year we've given thanks to God for the lives of two of our life-long members whose combined legacy has been very considerable. In December 2023, Pat Tourtel was, as the Salvation Army say, 'promoted to glory', and in March 2024, Peter Luce. Both had long associations going back to Aquila Road Church and participated fully in the development of Wesley Grove becoming St Helier Methodist Centre.

At Pat's Thanksgiving on January 10th, we recalled how she served with such distinction as a Local Preacher since 1981, her loyalty as Pastoral Worker to many in and out of this church; her willingness to serve in practical ways during the days of Aquila Youth Club; and her accurate, and much trusted keeping of shorthand minutes during the church's morph from Wesley Grove to Methodist Centre. All achieved with her bright and cheerful manner and self-effacing humour. As one person said, 'Pat was a stalwart, always there, encouraging, smiling and reliable'.

Those same qualities of encouragement and reliability were also very evident at Peter's Thanksgiving Service on April 3rd. The fact that we have our bright, comfortable Centre, is part of Peter's legacy. He was the wise, quiet counsel that advised the committee as to the legal and governance implications of refurbishing an 1847 listed building. In tight corners his calm manner helped find a way through. He chaired the Finance and Property committee for many years; over four decades gave loyal service with Gill on the Nestlings Nursery committee; in the wider network of island churches was our legal advisor; and also served on the board of the Biarritz Hotel. Many will recall with gratitude Peter's ability to combine wisdom and integrity, personal courage and determination, with self-effacing humour and intelligence.





Within the pastoral visitor's team there have been changes. Lou Hicklin and Pam Marrett have stepped down and thanks need to be expressed for all they have offered over many years. In their place we've been delighted to welcome Pauline O'Prey, Val MacDonald, Sally Vasselin and Carolyn Ainsworth to the team. We look forward to all that they will offer.

In addition to this structured pastoral support, there are numerous ways in which we all look out for each other. Through checking up on each other on a Sunday, phone calling, the occasional card and sharing of tomato plants, we become more and more the caring community that Christ calls us to be. Don't forget, the responsibility is ours, so let us all take the initiative to share prayers and kindness with each other, and when we see someone new at worship make sure they have a welcome pack and are shown the way through to coffee.

Finally, it has been great to welcome new people to the life of the church and we hope that SHMC feels home to you. To know more about Church Membership do speak with Tony, who would love to squeeze that service in before he leaves at the end of July.

It really brought it to life.

We would love to see new people come and join the group. We meet in the cafe at 11 a.m. every Thursday where we have coffee and a chat, the study and then a bowl of Ellen's tasty soup. I can highly recommend the courgette! All in all, it is a very enjoyable 2 hours, and it would be lovely to see you there.

Family Workers Reflections of the past Year

Sally and I (Ellen) run various group on a weekly basis with toddlers and babies who come along with a parent or carer. These groups run term time only. We also run 7Up Club and lead Sunday School. Our aim is to provide a warm, safe place for parents and their children. This gives us the wonderful opportunity to spread the love of God in the community, through the work that we do.

Mondays: Our Toddler Group (2 Years plus) involves play time, with toys, play dough, Bible Craft. We all tidy the hall together and then have snack time of toast and oranges. All prepared by Maureen. The toddlers then have a time on our wheelie toys before going up to the Church for a bible story, interactive songs and energetic fun! We have the same families come along each week so they can build friendships.

Tuesdays: We run a Non-Mobile Baby Group (birth – 9 months-ish). This group can be very busy. We do not advertise this group, so those who come have heard about it through word of mouth and have thoroughly enjoyed themselves. They start on the rugs on the floor chatting with each other and toys for their babies. Sally and I offer them a hot drink made by Maureen and a biscuit. Then we go up to the Church for sensory singing and fun.

Wednesdays: We Run our Crawlers Group (9 months up to 2 Years), where they play at the start, then we all tidy up and have snack time together of toast made by Maureen and oranges. Then we go up to the Church for interactive, sensory singing and fun! We have the same families come each week so that they can build friendships, which they have done, and some meet up outside of this group.



Sunday School: We run this session with the help of Jenna, Felicity, and Mildred on a rota basis. The number of children attending has increased with a few new children joining us. We explore the bible in many different ways, with story time, Godly Play, games, cooking, songs and crafts. This is a lovely time together.



Mini Messy Church: When the congregation is else where we have a Mini Messy Church at SHMC for our families. This can be very well attended and seems very popular. We always start the session with some kind of food like pancakes made by Rhea and Mary, or toast made by Libby. We have many bible crafts and a short time of worship and fun.

7Up: This group is held once a month at SHMC. It is for children ages 7 years up to 11 years. The children are dropped off by their parents. We play Table tennis, Table football, Pool, Corn hole, kick a ball around the hall, do a craft, or hang out on the sofas. We run a tuck shop. We then go up to the Church for a God Spot, where we discover more about God in our lives. Then we have pizza and 7Up and that's the end of the session. The children seem to love this time together and leave wanting more. We can have up to 15 children attend. Rubie usually cooks the pizza, which we are grateful for.



Award: We were nominated for the Pride of Jersey Community Champions of the Year Award by one of our families. We were in the JEP with all the other nominations. It was great to be appreciated for all the work that we do.

Family Pop in Sessions: Last July during the summer holidays, I (Ellen) held two fun days at the Centre with Sue and team. The theme was 'God's Wonderful world and how we should look after it' with an emphasis on recycling. We had related crafts in the café, toddler toys out in the hall and table tennis etc out in the youth room. It was a great success with over 150+ people attending over the two days. It had a great sense of community.

Lorry Rides: We went on a lorry ride again last year. The lorries picked us up from the Church and dropped us off after a little drive to Gorey beach, where we had our packed lunches, we played in the sea and volleyball was played on the sand. The weather and company were wonderful. We look forward to doing this again this year.

The future: I (Ellen) will be transferring across to the youth on a Sunday morning with Marcia, starting in the next few months, which I am looking forward to. I will continue with all the other children's work. Sally will be with the younger children on a Sunday morning. There will be times in the holidays when Sally and I will not be here. We would appreciate any offer of help to lead the Sunday School children on these occasions who are safe guarded or are happy to be safeguarded. Please speak with Sally or myself, if you would like to find out more. We pray that the number of children attending our groups continues to grow. God is Good!

Kairos Arts

Another year of growth for Kairos Arts!



In terms of therapeutic work, we have run group programmes for those affected by domestic abuse and sexual trauma; for Macmillan clients at the Oasis Centre; for Brighter Future's Mums at The Bridge; for teenagers at Haute Vallee Secondary School and children at La Moye Primary School, who are struggling with their mental health; for people with visual impairments at EyeCan; for homeless women supported by the Shelter Trust; facilitated eleven monthly Drop-in sessions for past participants of our domestic abuse programmes; led trauma-informed therapeutic sessions for staff at Grands Vaux School following the impact of the valley flooding; an Away Day for Prison Officers from HMP La Moye; and enabled a past participant to create a public Art Installation over four weeks to raise awareness about domestic abuse and then exhibited in the Salvation Army Café, October 2023.

Following our Level 6 Diploma training in 22/23 with the British Association of Art Therapists, our Therapeutic Arts Practitioners have facilitated weekly one-to-one sessions in seven schools and the Jersey Hospice, supporting twenty children or young people per term, who need support with their mental health. The demand is significant for this work, therefore, this year we have successfully launched our own Kairos Arts Level 6 Diploma in Therapeutic Arts Practice with Children and Young People based here in Jersey to meet demand and equip other professionals in their settings to use therapeutic art-based tools safely. We accepted eighteen students on to the course in September 2023, including three Kairos Arts Practitioners. We expect this area of work to continue to grow and develop and will be launching a

second year of the Diploma Course in September 2024.

We have employed a Training Manager to develop this work and as a Play Therapist she is also often in demand delivering CPD courses to other charities and organisations about Trauma-informed Practice, Attachment Play and Therapeutic Arts Practice for well-being.



We have loved continuing to engage with the community through 'Stitch and Natter' and 'Sip and Snip' groups. Crocheted or knitted blankets are made for us to gift to participants in our group programmes, who are invited to 'seal in' good things they want to hold on to through a blanket-hug, and then take it home at the end of the 6-week programme. The 'snippings' from magazines are used in lots of different sessions for collages, helping participants to express emotions.

Both community groups feel they are making a difference, whilst also fostering interaction and benefitting from the therapeutic power of creative activity.



Our annual fundraising event at SHMC, the Advent Concert with the Amity Singers, is a highlight in the calendar for us. We are so grateful to be able to use the Church as our venue and we love sharing these moments with our Church Family. It also marked the launch of our Bolivia Appeal.



With significant support from SHMC, our two weeks work in Bolivia exceeded our expectations.

We went to serve **Project Suma**, based in El Alto, with a 5-day programme for 13 adolescent girls; a well-being session for 12 women on their Restoration Programme; join them for a night visit to the local brothels to reach out to the women working there; visit their Freedom Business **SutiSana** who offers

employment to survivors; buy their ethical products; take part in a Survivor-led earring-making workshop; lead a 3-day retreat for 21 of the Project Suma Staff and finish the trip with a visit to **Casa De**

Mi Padre, a smaller family support centre in La Paz, to meet its new manager and buy products made by some of the people they support. Every part was meaningful and impactful. It was an immense privilege to play our part in the working out of Isaiah 61: "...to bestow on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of joy instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair."





We managed to find great opportunities this year for selling our products and following our trip to Bolivia we now have wonderful new lines to share, supporting artisans freed from exploitation, trafficking and the sex-trade. We love to give talks at groups, sharing about our work, and the stories behind the products.

We feel so grateful for God's provision of all our funding and partnerships, but particularly SHMC with the gift of premises and your prayerful support.

We are excited to see what God has planned for us next!

<u>Café</u>

The café is open Monday to Friday each week. It is a donations only café, supporting various charities over the months arranged by Di who contacts the charities. The charities we support are usually chosen by those who attend bible study on a Thursday.

Our aim is to offer the community a friendly, welcoming, and warm space, where everyone feels welcome. Can chat and relax. The café has a small play kitchen area for anyone with children.

We offer tea, coffee, and biscuits during the week, usually made by a member of staff who is free at the time. Sally and I continue to invite our mums/carers to stay following our three groups during the week, to sit and enjoy our café area. Offering the opportunity for them to not rush off but to stay, chat and have tea and coffee together. A few have really enjoyed this greatly.

Thursdays: We have a bible study in the café, currently exploring Revelations with Rev Tony Morling. A time shared by our Church family. The Bible study is followed with freshly made soup made by myself and french stick, followed by cake. Maureen makes the best Lemon Drizzle cake, which is thoroughly enjoyed (especially the end bits!). A wonderful time of fellowship.

Fridays: Move More Jersey with Jersey Mencap continue to come to SHMC with their clients, to use our hall for games. They always have a great time shouting and cheering. They really enjoy coming into the café for tea, coffee, hot chocolate, and biscuits served by our wonderful volunteers Di and Mirto. This remains a great opportunity, enjoyed by all.

Sundays: The café is also used when our congregation is elsewhere on a Sunday. We have a Mini messy Church with our families at SHMC and we always offer some kind of food including toast, pancakes or hot dogs, with tea, coffee or squash. This is possible because of some wonderful volunteers from our Church families.

Hopes for the Future: For more people to volunteer in the café, who like a good chat and can make a good cup of tea or coffee. For our Church members to take the opportunity to come and see the café during the week and its offerings. To offer food on a daily basis, which would be gratefully received. We would really value your support.

Management and Finance

Investigation work on the canopy at the front of the Church have concluded with several solution options provided. Following discussions with Builders and Engineers documents have been sent for planning permission to allow for a solution to be implemented once approved.

Management is grateful for everyone's patience in navigating scaffolding at the Centre for a long period. Considering the listing status of our church, there are complexities in consideration of appropriate and acceptable solutions and thus the time required.

In the meanwhile, the provision of stairs to the loft is still ongoing.

Separately we are also pleased to confirm that the repair work on the roof following the November storm damage is now completed. The full cost of repairs was covered by insurance subject to the stipulated excess of £500.

Julie has settled in well in the office in replacement for Sarah. Jackie has also finally retired after years of excellent service to the centre. We extend our thanks to Jackie for her long and dedicated service over the years. Ewa, who is her replacement, has settled in well in her role and working well with Julie and the remainder of the team.

Whilst the committee is responsible for the repairs and maintenance of the Centre, we are heavily indebted to the team of staff and volunteers who undertake this task. We are forever grateful to them all.

Comments on the Accounts

Attached are the independently reviewed accounts for the Church and Nursery for the year ended 31st August 2023.

The Church accounts shows a loss of $\pounds(27,276)$ against a budgeted loss of $\pounds(98,805)$. This is mainly due to $\pounds9k$ more income from room hire and $\pounds16k$ increased interest on cash balances driven by a high-rate environment. This was complimented by $\pounds48k$ underspend on repairs and maintenance due to timing on planned repairs and maintenance during the year. $\pounds5.8k$ was transferred to the General Property Fund.

The Nursery accounts show a net income in the sum of £140,477 which is a fantastic result when compared to a budgeted deficit of $\pounds(1,675)$. This is mainly due to $\pounds60k$ increase in fee income due to the Nursery operating at full capacity for much of the year, $\pounds5k$ increase in interest receivable on cash balances, $\pounds69k$ favourable staff costs due to operating at below target headcount and $\pounds10k$ less spend on other operating expenses due to excellent budget management by Louise.

The sum of £90,000 was transferred from the Nursery to the Church during the year.

And, for her services for well over a decade. Jackie stepped down on the 28th of March 2024. In the same breath we also welcome Ewa Powierska, who took over from Jackie.

It is difficult to believe that I have been in the role of Centre Administrator for almost 20 months, they say time flies when you're having fun, and it certainly has. I really enjoy the role and feel I have made some lifelong friends.

The long-term letting from Move More Jersey has continued this year. On a Friday morning Jersey Mencap come along to the centre and play Boccia, a similar game to bowls, this is followed by teas and coffees in the café which Di and Mirto continue to cater for, thank you Di and Mirto for your help. This event certainly brings a real buzz to the centre on Friday mornings.

All other long-term lettings remain unchanged; Emma-Jane Dance Academy, AA, Backbeat, Street Pastors – and Kairos in Ruby Ferguson House.

So far this year the Church has been hired by Music in Action, Jersey Music Association, Eisteddfod, St Georges prep school, Jersey Island Singers, and the Jersey Festival choir. We have several bookings for the coming year including a number of bookings from Music in Action up to May 2025, Family Nursing & Home Care fundraiser, JCG Leavers service as well as several bookings for Christmas concerts.

The School of Popular Music continue to hire the halls in the centre during school holidays and had a booking for the Easter break.

Foodbank work continues, with most referrals coming from Citizens Advice, we have also been supporting families from one of the local primary schools. The increase in living costs saw the number of people needing support in 2023 increase by 40%, the number of bags of food given out increased by 30%, with the amount of vouchers increased by 45%.

The Jersey Netball Association collected donations for us again this year during their league games in February, which Libby very kindly collected, thank you Libby. We also continue to receive regular donations from the congregation and St.Aubins, I would like to thank everyone who continue to donate, including those in the wider community.



Storm Ciaran which hit Jersey in November last year caused damage to the Church roof and after spending several months trying to get hold of a builder/roofer to quote for repairs, the insurance company appointed a loss adjuster to take this forward. Following a drone survey to identify where the majority of the damage occurred, scaffolding was erected, and repairs completed.

I would like to thank everyone for their ongoing support and feel that we are all one big family, which I feel privileged to be part of.

Nestling Nursery

2023 continued to be a challenging year in the nursery due recruiting good, qualified staff as recruitment is at an all-time low on the island. We have managed this by given 3 members of staff the opportunity to undertake the Team leader's level 2 course and 2 staff members of staff to undertake the Level 3 Management and leadership course to ensure the continuity of the operations of the nursery during staff holidays and absenteeism and to reward for all their contribution to the nursery. We will still continue to look at ways that we can attract the right candidate by looking at our whole package.

The nursery staff are very passionate about their continuous professional development and this year I planned more in-house training to give us the opportunity to train as one nursery team. All staff have successfully completed MAYBO training in January and Makaton Sign language in February. Promoting Children's Self-Regulation skills through play training will be implemented in April. This has been very beneficial for us as practitioners as this will keep us relevant in our practice by learning new appropriate skills to support and develop all the children to ensure that they have positive outcomes through their play to enable them to develop and thrive.

We are delighted to announce that Natalie Lempriere received the Wilma Allan award that was given by the Jersey Childcare Trust and presented to Natalie at Government House in November. Natalie was nominated by Louise for the award following her return to the nursery after being a full-time carer for her mother, and in a very short space of time completing her level 2 & 3 in childcare, showing a great deal of commitment & passion towards her work. Natalie is also responsible for all the charity events at the nursery. We are very proud of Natalie's achievements.

Last year at our moderation meeting with one of our regulators we discussed developing the garden area as this was an area that we have all agreed needs developing, this will ensure that we are providing a continuous provision by looking at the children's interests and capabilities. We hope to have our ideas into practice by summer 2024.
